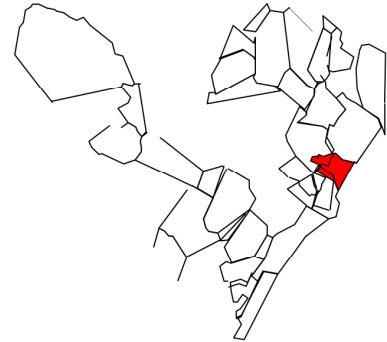


# James Ocheltree – 230 acres in Greenbrier County

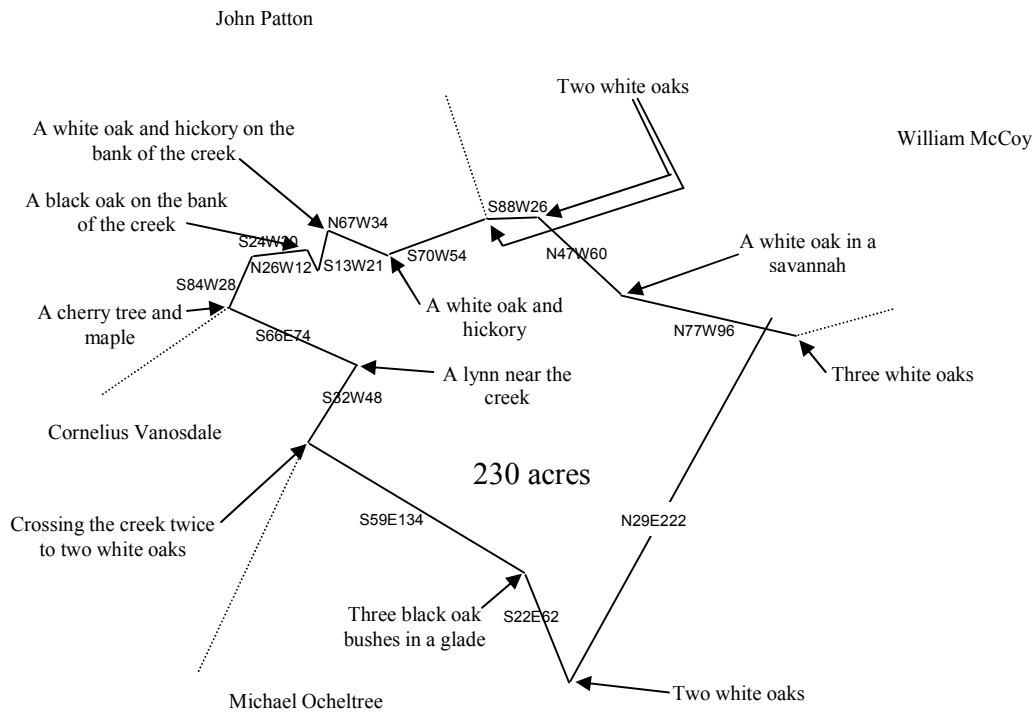

## Description

230 acres in Greenbrier County on Sinking Creek  
joining the lands of William McCoy, John Patton,  
Cornelius Vanosdale, and Michael Ocheltree



of Land containing eleven acres by survey bearing date the fourth of November seventeen hundred and ninety nine lying and being in the County of Greenbrier joining the land of Abraham Giltkison John Shwarts Rich lands and his own land and bounded as followeth to wit Beginning at a white oak on Lewis's line and corner to Giltkison & running with Lewis's line South fifty eight degrees west sixty poles to three Spanish oak saplings and hickory pointers at the intersection of the Rich lands survey corner at a glade and with the same North fifty eight degrees west thirtein poles to a dead white oak on said line and corner to his own land and with his own South twenty poles to a white oak and hickory by a road corner to Giltkison on Harriots line and runs with Giltkisons North twenty nine degrees east one hundred and two poles to the beginning, with its appurtenances to have and to hold the said tract or Parcel of Land with its appurtenances to the said Joseph Shantlin and his heirs forever, in witness whereof the said James Monroe Esquire Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia hath hereunto set his hand and caused the lesser Seal of the said Commonwealth to be affixed at Richmond on the eleventh day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and one and of the Commonwealth the twenty fifth. —

James Monroe Esquire Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia To all to whom these Presents shall come Greeting Where ye that by Virtue of a Land Office Treasurers warrant Number ten thousand six hundred and forty four issued the fifth of January seventeen hundred and eighty two there is granted by the said Commonwealth unto James Whittier a certain tract or parcel of land containing two hundred and thirty acres by survey bearing date the twelfth of October seventeen hundred and ninety nine lying and being in the County of Greenbrier on Sulking Creek joining the land of William McCoy John Patton Cornsboys Vonesdale and Michael Whittier and bounded as followeth to wit Beginning at three white oaks corner to McCoy and with his line North twenty seven degrees west twenty six poles to a white oak in a Sawannah North forty seven degrees west sixty poles to two white oaks South eighty eight degrees west twenty six poles to two white oaks corner to Patton and with his line South twenty degrees west fifty four poles to a white

Oak and hickory North sixty seven degrees west thirty four poles to a white oak and hickory on said Pattons line and on the bank of the creek and leaving said Pattons line down the bank South thirteen degrees west twenty one poles North twenty six degrees west twelve to a black oak on the bank of the creek and thence binding there with South eighty four degrees west twenty eight poles South twenty four degrees west thirty poles to a cherry tree and thence corner to Monasdale and his line South sixty six degrees east seventy four poles to a lynn near the creek South thirty two degrees west forty eight poles crossing the creek twice to two white oaks corner to Chellner and with his line South fifty nine degrees east one hundred and thirty four to three black oak bushes and a glade South twenty two degrees east sixty two poles to two white oaks thence North twenty nine degrees east two hundred and twenty two poles to the beginning with its appurtenances to have and to hold the said tract or parcel of land with its appurtenances to the said James Chellner and his heirs forever in witness whereof the said James Monroe Esquire Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia hath hereunto set his hand and caused the lesser seal of the said Commonwealth to be affixed at Richmond on the eleventh day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and one and of the Commonwealth the Twenty fifth.

To all to whom these presents shall come greeting know ye that by virtue of two Land Office Treasury warrants to wit. One hundred and fifty seven acres by number eleven thousand one hundred and one issued the twenty fifth of February seventeen hundred and eighty two, fifty five acres by number sixteen thousand eight hundred and twenty seven issued the twelfth of June seventeen hundred and eighty three— There is granted by the said Commonwealth unto William M. Hie a certain tract or parcel of Land containing two hundred and twelve acres by survey bearing date the twenty ninth of March seventeen hundred and ninety nine lying and being in the County of Hentawa on the waters of Gauley River and bounded as follows to wit— Beginning at a black oak on the river ridge opposite the mouth of Meadow River, corner to a survey of six hundred acres made for Shockwell and others and with lines of the same North twenty degrees west two hundred and twenty two poles to a small gum in said line and leaving the same South eighty three degrees east two hundred and fifty poles to a yellow lynn corner to a survey of five hundred acres of John
